Creating Multi-Club Competitions

Gordon Saperia Boston Camera Club (BCC) What is a multi-club competition? How many clubs are optimal?

Benefits and Costs

- Benefits
 - Keeps members involved
 - Enhances pride in club
 - Enhances stature of club
- Costs
 - Labor intensive
 - Relatively small financial investment

History

- BCC's involvement prior to 2013
- 2013, 2014, and 2015 Tri-Clubs with Newton and South Shore CCs
- 2020 Tri-Club with Stoney Brook and Gateway CCs

Early Steps

- Success is likely, but not guaranteed, with strong, early preparation
- Define reason(s) that your club should participate; get club approval
- Identify like-minded clubs (how to get other clubs interested)
- Identify lead person(s) at each club
- Assess compatibility of managers
- Agree on potential date
- Agree on format (categories, levels, #judges)
- Get commitment from judges
- Define the categories and circulate the definitions on the club's website
- Set time period for photo capture

Days before the competition

- Review scoring system with judge
- Make sure the all software is working and integrated across clubs
- Hold an abbreviated practice session with all judges

Comments about images

- Selection
- Transfer to judges for review

Competition night

- Master(s) of ceremonies
- Producer
- Timekeeper
- Scorekeepers
- Awards

Later steps

- Announcement to club members/promotion; repeat; repeat; repeat (how do you get members interested?)
- Decide on scoring
- Decide on awards
- Decide on process of selecting images at each club
- Communicate clearly with judges what you want from them
- Have a practice session with judges

Boston, Gateway and Stony Brook Camera Clubs

Tri-Club Competition 2019-2020

Overview: All members of the three clubs are invited to participate in this friendly competition. Members may choose to create digital photographic images in any or all of the nine categories. All images must be created within a six-month period beginning on October 1, 2019 and ending on March 31, 2020. In April, each club will select their best images in each category to compete in the Tri-Club competition event which will take place on Tuesday, April 28, 2020, 7:30-9:00PM at the Gateway CC location in Framingham.

For purposes of the Tri-Club, members will be assigned to Classes A and B to give everyone a fair chance to compete with others at a similar level of experience and skill. Each club will submit both a Class A and a Class B image to compete in each category. No more than one image per member will be selected by any club to compete in the event, to enable 18 members (9 categories x 2 classes) from each club to compete in the Tri-Club competition event.

The Tri-Club Competition on April 28 will be judged by a distinguished panel of judges who are independent of the three clubs. The judges will offer their educational comments on all of the images presented to them. Awards will be given to the best image in each class within each category. At the end, a Best in Show Award will also be determined for each class across all categories.

Categories and Definitions:

Category	Definition	
Abandoned	A person, place or object that has been left behind and may or may not have	
	fallen into a state of loneliness, decrepitude or decay	
Self-Portrait	A self-portrait is a representation of an artist that is photographed by that	
	artist. We expect this to go beyond a "Selfie" which is quick and less considered	
	and to illuminate a defining characteristic of the photographer. Does not have	
	to be a head shot. Does not have to include the face. Does not have to include	
	anything related to the subject as a photographer.	
Sports and Human	A depiction of a person or persons involved in a competitive or non-competitive	
Action	recreational activity, be it professional, organized or individual. Not walking or	
	work-related, but in pursuit of something more playful, fitness-related or	
	entertaining. The subject must be human – no animals.	
Shadow(s)	An image that emphasizes the light play introduced by a shadow or shadows,	
	and one in which the shadow(s) commands the viewer's interest in the image.	
Still Life	A deliberately composed and lit set piece of inanimate object(s)	
Water	An image that features water, whether on its own or as part of a scene,	
	conveying some unique property of water in nature, as controlled by man or as	
	an abstract medium - as long as it makes the viewer conjure up or feel water's	
	unique characteristics	
Black & White	Black and white and all shades of grey in between. No toning or two-color	
	submissions will be accepted, including no selective color.	
Landscape	Landscape photography is the art of capturing pictures of nature and the	
	outdoors in a way that brings your viewer into the scene. From grand	
	landscapes to intimate details, the best photos demonstrate the photographer's	
	own connection to nature and capture the essence of the world around	
	them. For this competition, the "hand of man" may be evident but should not	
	be the dominant feature of the image. Animals may be present but also should	
	not be the dominant feature.	
New Frontiers of Try something new and creative that you've never done before. This m		
Creativity	include getting it done inside the camera (e.g., long exposures, multiple	
	exposures, use of artificial light) or in post-processing that goes beyond simple	
	use of filters. Beyond simple altered reality, an image that will make the judge	
	say "I've never seen anything like this before" or "This really breaks some new	
	ground photographically".

Boston, Gateway, Newton and Stony Brook Camera Clubs Multi-Club Competition 2020-2021

We are competing this year with three other clubs: Boston, Gateway and Newton. Your photos must originate in the period of April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021. Each club will select their best photos in each category to compete in the multi-club competition in April, 2021. We will compete in Classes A and B with rules and format similar to last year. Participation is open to all club members.

Abstract: If you search for a definition of abstract photography you are likely to find explanations saying that abstract photography is difficult to define. In general, however, abstracts are created in-camera or in post-processing, by removing the context from the subject being photographed. This can be accomplished by zooming in, blurring, blending, focusing on a small section, exaggerating or distorting an aspect of the subject, or otherwise using "color, light, shadow, texture, shape and/or form to convey a feeling, sensation or impression". Viewers should see an expressive image without necessarily being able to say what it is an image of.

Architecture: Architectural photography is the photographing of buildings and similar structures that are both aesthetically pleasing and accurate representations of their subjects. This can include both interiors and exteriors of the buildings or structures.

Life during COVID: Our lives have all changed since the novel coronavirus that causes COVID-19 began threatening the world in early 2020. It may not be fun, but this is a momentously historic time. This category is for capturing scenes, events and changes wrought in our "new normal" that would have been impossible to capture in any other time. Images will be rewarded for their story-telling capability and should convey the human experience, whether around our house, with our loved ones, in settings specific to the crisis or on the street, whether heroic or mundane. Capture an image that will be relevant and interesting 50 years from now to explain what we are all going through, together or alone.

Macro/Close-up: Macro/Close Up photography is the act of photographing small objects such as flowers or insects, but not limited to those subjects, in close range so the subject you are photographing fills or nearly fills the frame. In other words, it's the act of photographing subjects close up. To keep things simple, we would say that the photographed subject should be no larger than 4"x6". We would not be strict about this, but the size reference should give you an idea of the range of subject size that is appropriate for this category.

Monochrome: We are using the Photographic Society of America definition: An image is considered to be Monochrome only if it gives the impression of having no color (i.e. contains only shades of grey which can include pure black and pure white) OR it gives the impression of being a greyscale image that has been toned in one color across the entire image. (For example, by Sepia, red, gold, etc.) A greyscale or multi-colored image modified or giving the impression of having been modified by partial toning, multi toning or by the inclusion of spot coloring does not meet the definition of monochrome.

Motion: A photograph is a slice of time. Use your photograph to show the motion that's happening in that slice. Appropriate images can stop the action or blur the action. Camera may move or remain stationary. Multiple exposures are allowed.

Reflections: Reflection photography, also referred to as mirror photography, is when you use reflective surfaces to create an artistic echo of a scene. A reflection image should be captured incamera rather than added through manipulation in post-processing.

Two Things: The photo should be about the relationship between two subjects. The subjects can be anything - animal (including people!), vegetable, mineral, or any combination thereof. The relationship does not have to fit any particular definition, but there should clearly be some relationship or interaction between two main subjects. The goal is to create the image in-camera, so while normal photo editing is allowed, the relationship should not be created through compositing.


